Keynote speaker



Hon Dr Keizo Takemi, MP, Japan

Hon Dr Keizo Takemi is a Liberal Democratic Party (LDP) member of the Japanese House of Councillors and serves as Chairman of the Investigation Committee on Governing Structure of the House of Councillors, and as Deputy Chairman of the LDP's General Council. He served as State Secretary for Foreign Affairs in 1998–1999, and was Senior Vice Minister of Health, Labour and Welfare in 2006–2007.

In the global health field, he has been involved in various initiatives including as a Champion of the Global Health Workforce Alliance since 2010, and as Chair of Asian Forum of Parliamentarians on Population and Development since 2013.

Dr Dharmapriya Wesumperuma, Social Protection Advisor for the Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement, Republic of the Union of Myanmar

Dr Wesumperuma is an expert in ageing, development and social protection. He has a PhD in History from the University of London.

After 18 years as Executive Director of the Sri Lanka Foundation, Dr Wesumperuma became the Senior Strategy Adviser and Regional Head of Programmes, East Asia/Pacific, for HelpAge International.

Plenary speakers



Mr Philip O'Keefe, Lead Economist, Social Protection and Labour, The World Bank, Australia

Philip O'Keefe is Lead Economist in the Social Protection and Labour Global Practice at the World Bank. He is currently leading the East Asia Pacific regional flagship on Ageing.

Previously, he was Sector Coordinator for Human Development for China in Beijing, leading work on social security, labour and human development issues, and was based in India as social protection coordinator. This followed a decade of work on social security, labour and social services in transition countries of the former Soviet Union and Eastern Europe. Philip holds degrees from University of Sydney, the London School of Economics and Political Science, and Oxford University.



Mr Nalaka Gunawardene, Executive Director, TVE Asia Pacific, Sri Lanka

Trained as a science writer, Nalaka Gunawardene has more than 25 years of experience in journalism and communication. In this time, he has worked in mainstream print and broadcast media, as well as with the development community in Sri Lanka and at Asian regional level.

In 1996, Nalaka co-founded TVE Asia Pacific, a not-for-profit media foundation engaged in communicating development via TV, video and web. Nalaka has also worked as a communications consultant for international organisations such as UN-ESCAP, UNEP, UNDP and Asian Development Bank. He is an active blogger, op-ed essayist and journalist trainer.



Mr Eduardo Klien, Regional Director, East Asia/Pacific, HelpAge International

Eduardo Klien has more than 25 years experience in social and economic development. He graduated in International Management and Political Science from universities in the Netherlands and the USA, and obtained a MSc in Economics from El Colegio de México.

Eduardo has worked as Senior Adviser in the Ministry of Planning in Nicaragua and for Oxfam as Regional Manager for the Horn of Africa and Regional Director for Mexico/Central America.

In 1997 Eduardo was appointed as a Visiting Research Fellow in the Department of International Development at the University of Oxford, and in 2007 he was appointed as a Research Fellow at the Oxford Institute of Population Ageing, also at the University of Oxford. For the last 15 years Eduardo has been living and working in Asia, holding different directive positions in Laos, Vietnam and regionally.



Ms Eva Sabdono, Executive Director, Yayasan Emong Lansia, Indonesia

Eva Sabdono has extensive experience in the business world, both in her native Jakarta and overseas, and she counterbalances the business life with activism in social development. Over the past 15 years, after joining Yayan Emong Lansia, where she currently serves as Executive Director, Eva has developed an international reputation for her passion to improve care conditions for older Indonesians. She is an active member of the Women's International Club, ASEAN Women's Association, Alzheimer's Indonesia and the Indonesia Gerontology Association, to name but a few.



Ms Usa Khiewrord, Regional Programme Manager, HelpAge International

Usa Khiewrord has over 20 years experience in community and social development and ageing. At HelpAge, Usa works to promote improvement in aged care, with a focus on ASEAN countries. She worked closely with HelpAge Korea in the implementation of the ROK-ASEAN Home Care for Older People project in ten ASEAN countries, and continues to provide technical support to HelpAge Korea in implementation of the new project on community-based services for older people in Cambodia, Laos, Myanmar and Vietnam.

Usa is also a regional focal point on social protection for HelpAge, promoting income security in old age through advocacy for improvement and expansions of social protection and pensions for older people. Usa holds degrees in Social Development and Social Work, and a MSc in Gerontology from King's College, London.



Professor Tine Rostgaard, Aalborg University, Denmark

Tine Rostgaard is Professor at the Department of Political Science, Centre for Comparative Welfare Studies (CCWS), Aalborg University. She holds a PhD in comparative social care. Her research contributions has mainly been to the field of social care for children and elderly, and more specifically to the understanding of care regimes, family obligations, welfare mix, consumerism in care and quality in care. She has acted as regional expert for HelpAge International in Asia in the comparative study of community based care. She has also recently headed a comparative European project on reforms in home care for elderly (LIVINDHOME).

Parallel session overviews

Should flexible retirement be promoted?

What are the alternatives to a fixed retirement age? This session will discuss different options for retirement, including extensions of retirement ages and flexible retirement, and their implications, and provide recommendations for action in this area.

Older people in community development: Mobilisation, empowerment and scale-up

Despite impressive localised examples of community mobilisation of older people, challenges remain in 'scaling up' from these examples. This session will give an overview of different approaches taken to scale up and identify some common barriers and how these can be overcome. The session aims to articulate some recommendations for both policy makers and practitioners working in communities about how to maximise the resources available from older people for local development.

Ageing in the Post 2015 agenda: An opportunity for inclusion

This session will reflect on the progress made to date to include older people in the post 2015 agenda. With the Sustainable Development Goals nearing formalisation, this session will reflect on how they can not only cover the vulnerabilities of older people but also support the creation of enabling environments to maximise older people's economic and social contributions.

Older people in the informal sector: Unrecognised workers

Does society encourage or discourage people from earning income in old age? How can we maximise the contribution of older people? Many people continue to work into later life in the informal sector, and face different challenges which affect their productivity and quality of life. How will this impact the labour force in the future? This session will discuss the context and situation of work in old age in the informal sector.

Active older people in emergencies and disaster preparedness

What is the implication of longevity, health and education on the role of older people in emergency response and disaster risk reduction? How can society increase the potential of older people to contribute to emergency responses and disaster preparedness for the benefit of entire

communities? This session will look at some of the activities older people are already involved in and ideas for their increased participation in the future.

How can we involve older people in healthy ageing? Challenges, priorities and roadmap

Mixed progress has been made on healthy ageing, particularly on involving older people in the process. This session aims to identify the gaps and challenges in the region on healthy ageing, and identify and emphasise older people's roles in healthy ageing. Group discussion will focus on priorities and a suggested road map focusing on older people's involvement on healthy ageing.

Who is farming the land? The ageing of farm populations and its implications for policy and practice

What are the challenges and what are the opportunities of an ageing farm population? Is the ageing of the farming population a threat? This session will present evidence on the characteristics and outcomes of older farmers' work. Participants will then debate the challenges and opportunities of an ageing farm population and come up with recommendations for policy and practice.


The contribution of older volunteers in ageing societies: The case of China


The growth in the 60+ demographic is a major community resource that is not fully utilized. One of the ways older people can continue to be active is through volunteerism. This session aims to develop a better understanding of the global human capital of ageing populations and present ideas on some activities in which older volunteers participate in China that could be tried in other countries.

How elders contribute to the household and family

What policies would help older people to make contributions to the family? This session will discuss the practical contributions that older people play at household level and how those contributions can be maximised and supported. The findings of research comparing Myanmar, Thailand and Vietnam will be presented and reflections from community level work in Indonesia will also be shared.

Field visits

Sanpatong: The community learning centre and participation of older people

Delegates will visit the community learning centre in Ban San Gorget, a village in Sanpatong district, Chiang Mai, where older people, led by Mrs Srinuan Manopunya, have actively participated in and contributed to its activities to serve the community.

On this field visit, delegates will learn about one of the centre's key local development activities – the development of local enterprises processing agricultural products and managing the associated waste. Delegates will also have the opportunity to learn about mobilising community support to help frail older people through home-based care run by older persons' groups, and a community savings group which enhances welfare in the community.

Saraphi: Traditional medicine, income generation and older people's groups

This field visit will take delegates to visit the older people's group in Thawangtan village, Saraphi district, Chiang Mai, which is a member of the Senior Citizen's Council of Thailand (SCCT). The group has been recognised for its continued efforts to support its members and the wider community.

The group will share information about their activities with delegates, focusing on their traditional medicine group which has proved very popular in the district, and their community cooperative shop that provides job opportunities and income to the group's members. The group will also present their local learning centre for older people, known as the 'University for Older People', which is a new initiative that aims to increase learning opportunities and maximize the potential of older people.

Banthi: Community-based care and older people's groups

The Banthi Older People's Group was established to help older people in the community who are caring for their children who are HIV positive. Since 2011 the group has been supported by Banthi hospital to provide information about caring for older people. Local authorities also provide funding to the group for home visits to older people and people in need.

Delegates on this field trip will learn how the group works together with local organisations to arrange financing for older people's care and to organise activities for older people, including vocational training and social activities.

Doi Saket - Older people leading the way in organic farming

In Doi Saket district, delegates will visit the organic farm of Mr Boonchuay Boonyen, 66, the local leader of an organic farming network. Mr Boonchuay and a local NGO leader, Mr Kaittisak, will talk to delegates about making the switch to organic farming, how the network works to support members and the community, and how older people in the district are leading the way in this kind of agriculture. Delegates will also have the opportunity to tour the farm and Mr Boonchuay's vegetable gardens.
